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WELCOME

We have arrived at the 5th edition of this festival, continuing in our mission to bring productions and adaptations of Shakespeare's works to York from around the world. These productions act as windows into other cultures, enabling us to see diverse perspectives as we engage with international artists and their interpretation of plays that we think we know well. This is important after Brexit, and the restraints of Covid, as the UK reconfigures its relationship with Europe and other parts of the world. Without fail, we are prompted to think again.

It is particularly special to have the Kyiv National Academic Molodyy Theatre with us. Their production of A Midsummer Night's Dream is joyous and life affirming, and they will also be sharing their skills with us in workshops and talking a little about what it's like to make theatre in Ukraine in a time of conflict.

Festival Artist in Residence Jakub Snochowski comes from Poland to present the first performance of his new play in English, and to work with students across the city. We also have premieres in English of Shakespeare-related plays from Croatia and Romania. From the UK, both Flabbergast Theatre and Tim Crouch are decidedly international in their outlook. York Shakespeare Project turn Shakespeare's long poem Lucrece into a play for our times. For children, there's Shakespeare Storytelling in Primary Schools and Libraries, and we're launching our first book – York Loves Shakespeare.

We're delighted to have received funding from Arts Council England. Their support means that much of the festival is free or at an accessible ticket price. We encourage you to see work that might be something new and different.

We're also pleased to continue previous relationships and build new ones across the city. These include York Theatre Royal and the University of York. Our festival hub is at Friargate Theatre and we are grateful to the administrative team from Riding Lights. We are excited to be building a new collaboration with staff and students at York St John University.

Our festival opens up a conversation between Shakespeare, our city and our time, and we're delighted to invite you to come and be part of it.

A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM

How does the well-known romantic comedy A Midsummer Night's Dream sound in the context of a Ukrainian traditional rite? Shakespeare's play is seen as a one-of-a-kind ceremonial performance. In the words of a famous writer, we poetize traditional rituals. In the global narrative, we locate the key to the national code and adapt it to the present. We establish parallels with our historical stories by changing the major characters from Greeks to Ukrainians. At the same time, we leave the foundation to William Shakespeare, and the resulting blend appears current, natural, and unique. On stage, reality melts into legend.

OUR WORK PLACEMENT STUDENTS

We are working with English Literature students at York St John University to deliver the York International Shakespeare Festival. Here they reflect on the experience.

This is also an area that I'm really interested in outside of my degree. I feel it has helped me develop transferrable skills, from researching productions and working with international theatre companies, to developing my communication skills and learning how to use IT in a professional capacity. This is good experience for a variety of jobs.

I've found this a really interesting work placement. It has really broadened my horizons in terms of my career prospects. Working with events or with theatre companies wasn't anything I'd thought of before. I had no experience or knowledge about this type of work, but now it is definitely a career option. I would love to do something like this after I graduate, and I'm developing skills that can help make that a reality.

l've learnt a lot of new skills that will be useful in the workplace. I've written a press release and I have been contacting national media outlets. I also really like that working for the York International Shakespeare Festival ties in with my degree subject. It feels relevant to my course.

Two other students are also doing work placements:

Rosie is the festival blogger. This placement centres on interviewing festival contributors, such as writers and directors, to publicise the festival and create a record of it.
