There are 4 ways of contributing to the conference and we welcome proposals in any of the following ways:

- **Case study presentations** explain your research and experience(s) to other students. This type of contribution consists of 10 minutes presenting, followed by 5 minutes for questions and answers.
- **Workshops** are hands-on demonstrations of research projects. The workshop is an opportunity for the facilitator to reflect on and introduce others to their research processes, methodologies and approaches. Each workshop consists of 25 minutes interactive presenting, followed by 5 minutes for questions and answers.
- **Posters** offer opportunities to display your approach to undertaking the research and drawing on the main outcomes.
- **Performances or exhibits** creatively demonstrate students' work from a range of disciplines such as film, photography, art, music and theatre.

The conference showcases excellent undergraduate research work and enables you to participate in interesting discussions and think about further study.
