Vitae Researcher Development Framework (RDF)

The RDF is a professional development framework for planning, promoting, and supporting the personal, professional and career development of researchers in higher education. It articulates the knowledge, behaviours and attributes of successful researchers and encourages them to realise their potential.

It has key four domains: Knowledge and Intellectual Abilities; Personal Effectiveness; Research Governance and Organisation; and Engagement, Influence, and Impact. The RDF supports the implementation of the Concordat to Support the Career Development of Researchers – on which YSJ is a signatory - and the QAA Code of practice for research degree programmes.

The Vitae Researcher Development Framework (RDF) Planner is available for you to access. This valuable tool enables you to identify potential gaps in your skills, plan your career, and record your achievements. By using the planner, you can create a realistic action plan to assist you in your development and use this as evidence within your reviews and supervision meetings.

The Brilliant Club is an award-winning university access charity. They work closely with PhD and post-doctoral researchers, training them as university access professionals and placing them as tutors in schools. Here they deliver academically rigorous programmes to small groups of high potential pupils from low higher education-participation backgrounds.

The charity works in partnership with universities and schools across the UK; to date nearly 2000 researchers have worked as PhD tutors.
